The Alberti Program:

ARCHITECTURE FOR YOUNG PEOPLE



2024 Alberti Program at the Sam Fox School

The Sam Fox School's Alberti Program welcomed 35 elementary and middle school students from 23 schools across the St. Louis region to its architecture curriculum this summer to learn about Architecture & Sustainable Design. Over two-thirds of participants qualified for tuition waivers based on financial need.

Throughout the program, students embarked on a variety of projects, aided by school faculty and six WashU students teaching assistants. By the end of the four-week program, students developed a variety of skills and perspectives, including 3D-modeling techniques; an understanding of scale, spatial order, landscape and natural phenomena in the design process; and an ability to speculate through a critical and fruitful design process.

They also embarked on three trips to architecturally significant sites in St. Louis: the Saint Louis History Museum, the St. Louis Aquarium, and longtime program partner PGAV Destinations, a downtown firm that designs tourist attractions all over the world.

The youth participants hosted and showcased their work in an open public exhibition on-campus in the Steinberg Gallery at the Sam Fox School.

Each year, we conduct surveys with the youth participants. At the end of the program, 97% of the youth participant survey respondents answered they were either extremely comfortable or comfortable in their knowledge of architecture, a growth of 28% of participants from the start of the program.



The summer curriculum and daily activities are organized around core learning outcomes. The following outcomes guided this summer's session:

- develop high standards of design techniques through three-dimensional modeling techniques
- ability to speculate through a fruitful and critical design process and articulate these intentions in visual and verbal forms
- develop an understanding of scale and the relationship between human body and architecture
- develop an understanding of material tectonics and the formation of spatial order
- understand the importance of landscape and natural phenomena in the design process
